Connecting Patients of Reproductive Age to Care and Coverage

Frontline staff play an important role helping connect people of reproductive age to care and coverage. Integrating a few simple steps into your workflow can help strengthen patient experience and connection to needed services.

- Screen un/underinsured patients for eligibility for common Medicaid programs.
 - A. Do you live in Illinois?
 - B. Are you currently pregnant?
 - C. What is your age?
 - D. How much do you make per month before taxes?

"Great! Based on your responses it sounds like you may qualify for":

Program	Income Limit	Citizenship	Duration
ACA Adults (19-64)	<138% FPL Family Income	U.S. Citizen or on path to citizenship	12 months with renewal
Moms & Babies*	<213% FPL Family Income	Any immigration status	Pregnancy & 12 months after
HFS FPP	<213% FPL Indiv. Income	U.S. Citizen or on path to citizenship	12 months
FPPE	<213% FPL Indiv. Income	Any immigration status	Immediate approval, 31-60 days

^{*}Must be pregnant

If patients do not qualify, provide assurance that you can still meet their care needs and place them on a sliding fee scale.

"No problem. We will never turn you away due to inability to pay."

2. Ensure patients calling for family planning are connected to needed services in a way that is:

Timely



Patients should be offered a birth control appointment within **2-3 weeks.** Visits for emergency contraception (EC), PEP, or DoxyPEP should be scheduled within 48 hours.

Flexible:



Appointments for self-administered methods (pill, patch, ring, EC pills) should be made with the **first available primary care provider** and/or may be scheduled for a telehealth slot.

Confidential:



Anyone **12+** can schedule a birth control, EC, or STI appointment on their own, without a parent or guardian.

Frequently asked questions:

Is emergency contraception (EC) the same as the abortion pill?

No. EC prevents pregnancy from occurring while abortion pills terminate existing pregnancies.

Can an IUD be used as emergency contraception?

Yes. Either the copper IUD or progestin IUD can be used as emergency contraception if inserted within 5 days after unprotected sex.

Do I have to use my parent's insurance?

No. If you have concerns about safety/privacy with your insurance (under parents or partner), you can apply for the HFS FPPE/FPP on your own.
